Death of James Richard White

3 Garden Terrace, Southsea. This was the home of his son Charles White, who was present at the death, and was the informant.

Until the death of his wife Sarah in 1881, James had lived in Sussex Street, where he owned two houses, numbers 3 and 4, used as lodging houses.

In his will dated 7th May 1881, he wished these to be sold, and his total assets divided equally between his children Frederick Richard White, James White (who was co-executor), Eliza Cudlipp, Montague Edward White, George White and Charles White.

James was 68, a Dockyard pensioner. He had been a painter in Portsmouth Dockyard.

He died of 'Apoplexy'. His youngest son Charles, who was 'present at the death', was the informant.
