Marriage of Charles White to Mary Jane Allen Mortimer

Milton Parish Church, Portsmouth

Charles' father was James Richard White, who had recently retired from working as a painter in H.M. Dockyard, Portsmouth.

Mary's father was John Mortimer, a farm bailiff who had died suddenly at his work in Pokesdown, in 1867.

The witnesses were:

Susanna Egan, and

James R White, Charles' father.

At the time of his marriage, Charles had been working in Cawood, Yorkshire, and their first two children were born there.

Mary had been working as a maid in the James White household (see the 1871 census).
